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This year marks Kelly King Horne's 21st anniversary of working at Homeward, the planning agency that supports the network of homeless service providers delivering coordinated and compassionate solutions to homelessness in the Richmond, VA region. She has served as the Executive Director of Homeward since 2007 and has worked in various collaborative roles with Homeward and the United Way of Greater Richmond & Petersburg from 2003 to 2007.

Since 2018, Kelly has served on the Leadership Council for the National Alliance to End Homelessness, a national leader in addressing homelessness. From 1995 to 2003, Kelly worked in Europe and the former Soviet Union with Habitat for Humanity International and with the Peace Corps (Republic of Moldova).

Kelly received her M.A. in Religious Studies from Stanford University in 1993 and her B.A. in Interdisciplinary Studies from American University in Washington, D.C. In 2015, she earned a Certificate in Business Excellence from Columbia Business School.

She is a 1987 graduate of Monacan High School and is the mother of Charlotte (Monacan Class of 2023) and Georgia (Monacan Class of 2025). She and her husband Jonathan enjoy supporting the Monacan Marching Band and the Humanities program



Dr. Butler has published extensively, covering topics in Surgery, Diving Medicine, Hyperbaric Medicine, Aerospace Medicine, and Human Subject Research. His total publications and posters/ presentations exceed 140 and 80, respectively. Some of his previous honors include Air Force Association (Texas) Clinician of the Year; five-time Instructor of the Year for the USAF School of Aerospace Medicine's Advanced Aerospace Medicine for International Medical Officers Course; United States Central Command's Theater Validating Flight Surgeon (Al Udeid, Qatar); and the Aerospace Medical Association's John Ernsting Award.

Dr. Butler has also been an academician, from Fellowship Director for the Davis Hyperbaric Laboratory to Assistant Professor at USUHS and Professor at the USAF School of Aerospace Medicine. He currently serves as the Chair of the Aerospace Medicine Fellowship Residency Advisory Committee for the Mayo Clinic.

Noting a significant rise in both DCS and DCS-related deaths among Maine's urchin divers, Dr. Butler designed, funded, and implemented a survey of those divers. He then briefed the findings to the Legislature, ensuring the enactment of safety laws. Additionally, he created a "safe diver roadshow," teaming with private and Coast Guard resources for numerous town halls along coastal Maine. Urchin diver deaths plummeted in subsequent years.

Most Recently, Dr. Butler has focused on the research and development of a physiologic-based approach for aeromedical evacuation for critically ill or injured patients while minimizing postflight morbidity. This unique body of work culminated in a 261-page research review and programmed-learning monograph entitled "Physiological Foundation for Clinical Validation of Aeromedical Evacuation Patients." This monograph stands as a one-stop resource for the logical and coherent application of today's science to aeromedical evacuation, educating the next generation and saving countless lives.

Dr. Butler is a 1971 graduate of Thomas Dale High School.



Born and raised in Midlothian, Virginia, Brian is a proud graduate of Robious Elementary, Midlothian Middle, and Midlothian High School. Brian graduated cum laude from The College of William and Mary with a degree in Economics, where he was inducted into the Omicron Delta Kappa Society, served as the Chair of the Fraternity Council, and received the Benjamin Stoddert Ewell Award for leadership and service to the College. After two years working as a consultant for the firm Arthur Andersen in Washington, D.C., Brian returned to Williamsburg to attend Marshall-Wythe School of Law. Brian served on the William and Mary Law Review and Moot Court Team and was honored to be inducted into the Order of the Colf.

Back in Richmond, Brian joined the Civil Litigation team of a local law firm. Eventually, Brian opened his own law practice to focus on education law, specifically special education, where he represented families of children with disabilities. Brian was recognized as a Top 40 Under 40 in Richmond for his dedication to ensuring the educational rights of his clients.

Through his special education practice, Brian met Alan Kirshner, the co-founder of what was then known as The Faison School for Autism. Faison became a client of Brian's, and he helped them open The Faison Residence, which was one of the first community-integrated residential models for adults with autism in the country. After working closely with the Faison Board and leadership, Brian was offered the position of President & CEO. Brian wrapped up his legal practice and dove headfirst into the world of autism. Under his leadership, what was just a school grew into a world-class center for autism that now provides services to individuals with autism of all ages along the autism spectrum.

Today, The Faison Center operates an Early Education Center, The Faison School in Richmond, the Peninsula School in Newport News, the Faison Residence, the Family Partner Program, and an Adult Day program. To support this growth, Brian and his team successfully completed a five-year, \$24 million capital campaign that added four new buildings and an outdoor learning center on the Richmond campus and another \$1.5 million campaign to build out the Newport News campus.

Brian routinely works with legislators at the Virginia General Assembly on legislation involving special education laws and other laws that impact individuals with autism and those who provide services to them. To advocate for and expand best practices for autism service providers, Brian was elected to the Board of the Council of Autism Service Providers (CASP), where he just finished serving four years as that organization's Chair. Brian considers himself one of the most fortunate people in the world for being able to do what he does every day. He is also extremely grateful to two tremendous mentors in his life--Alan Kirshner and John Hagadorn, Brian's senior year high school English teacher.



Victor McKenzie Jr. is a nonprofit leader, healthcare advocate, and change agent dedicated to making a positive impact in his community. Currently serving as the Executive Director of SAARA of Virginia, Victor leads statewide advocacy and education efforts for individuals affected by substance use disorder. His leadership is marked by an inclusive and collaborative approach, actively involving team members in decision-making processes.

Victor's extensive experience in civic engagement and public policy is evident through his numerous board involvements. In 2021, he was appointed by Governor Northam to the state's Opioid Abatement Authority, recognizing his expertise and dedication to addressing critical social issues. In 2023, he was named Chair of Virginia's Addiction and Recovery Council, further solidifying his leadership in the field. Victor also serves on several community boards, state workgroups, and commissions, where his insights and guidance significantly contribute to policy development and community initiatives.

Victor has been recognized with multiple awards for his outstanding service and dedication to improving community health and civic engagement. He cares deeply about social issues and community impact work, particularly with underserved and underinvested communities. His participation in leadership programs from his local community foundation and statewide training initiatives further underscores his commitment to continuous improvement.

Victor is committed to being a force for good and a conduit for the community voice. His ability to articulate a clear vision and connect meaningfully with his team has been instrumental in driving organizational success and ensuring timely project completion. With a strong foundation in leader-ship, Victor McKenzie Jr. continues to champion positive change and advocate for those in need.

Victor lives with his wife Dominique, daughter Lily Rae, and two dogs in Richmond, Virginia. He is a 2010 graduate of Meadowbrook High School.
